Expansion of Mandatory Electronic Filing in Supreme Court: 8th Judicial District –

Erie and Niagara Counties

I am pleased to provide the Bar and other interested persons with an update on the progress of the New York State Courts' Electronic Filing System ("NYSCEF"). The District Administrative Judge of the 8<sup>th</sup> Judicial District has proposed the expansion of the mandatory e-filing program in the Supreme Courts of Erie and Niagara Counites to include in rem tax foreclosures and RPTL 730 proceedings. The County Clerk of each County has joined in this request, and it is supported by the Deputy Chief Administrative Judge Outside NYC.

Beginning December 22, 2021, the authorization will be to expand mandatory e-filing in the Supreme Courts of Erie and Niagara Counties to include all new civil actions, except:

- CPLR Art. 70 proceedings
- CPLR Art. 78 proceedings
- Election Law proceedings
- matrimonial matters
- Mental Hygiene Law matters

Additionally, in Niagara County Supreme Court the following case types are also an exception:<sup>1</sup>

- consumer credit transactions as defined in CPLR 105(f)\*
- residential foreclosure actions as defined in RPAPL 1304\*
   (\*except initial filing of commencement papers by a represented party, which is mandatory)

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>1</sup> Legislation, (L. 2015, Ch. 27), imposes restrictions on the Chief administrative Judge to exercise discretion in mandating electronic filing in certain case types, (CPLR 70 & 78, election law proceedings, matrimonial actions, residential foreclosure actions, and consumer credit transactions). However, this restriction does not apply to consumer credit transactions and residential foreclosure actions e-filed in Erie County, as mandatory e-filing of these two case types has been authorized prior to the effective date of L. 2015, Ch. 27, and as such is considered "grandfathered-in."

The existing consensual e-filing programs in the Supreme Courts of Erie and Niagara Counties will be modified to include the case types that are not subject to mandatory e-filing; and Niagara County Supreme Court will additionally include the consensual e-filing of documents filed after commencement papers in consumer credit transactions and residential foreclosure actions.

Please note that by legislation and statue all unrepresented parties are automatically exempt from participating in e-filing in any case. However, unrepresented parties may choose to e-file. Information on how to do so is available at <a href="http://www.nycourts.gov/efile-unrepresented">http://www.nycourts.gov/efile-unrepresented</a>. Attorneys who certify in good faith that they lack requisite hardware, electronic connection, or technical knowledge to participate in e-filing, may opt out of e-filing.

E-filing represents an important and necessary advance for the courts and the legal profession in New York State. We thank you for the wonderful support and cooperation you have shown and look forward to continuing to work closely with you as the program continues to move forward.
